During the visit an extended discussion was held with me regarding the school's internal data, a learning walk was carried out to view the school in session, including

Children's Mental Health Week 2017

Earlier this term Place2Be organised the National Children's Mental Health Awareness Week and Harrow Way dedicated a special tutor time lesson to considering the issue.

It is a concerning reality

that 1 in 10 young people will experience a mental health condition at some point while growing up and 1 in 4 adults will be affected in their lifetimes.

The aim of the lesson in school was to raise awareness of conditions, support young people in recognising how to stay healthy and reduce the stigma attached to mental health and to build a supportive community.

Year 7 focused on a general introduction to well-being and all the components of staying healthy, including

exercise, diet and relaxation. Years 8 and 9 looked at the most common conditions and the stereotypes and stigma attached to mental health conditions and the barriers this can cause to people seeking support.

Meanwhile Years 10 and 11 spent their time considering managing anxiety and stress around exam time and how to prepare for their exams staying healthy. This included considering ways to reduce stress by preparing early, eating and sleeping well and keeping balance with work and relaxation and exercise.

The sessions were very effective and there is a new level of understanding throughout the school with one Year 9 commenting: "The lesson really helped me to think about how mental health is portrayed in the media and makes it difficult for those with mental health conditions to tell people about it because of the stigma attached".

Former American Footballer inspires Year 11 with their game plan

Former pro-American footballer Jim Roberson touched down once again to work his motivational magic with Year 11 getting them game ready for their exams and beyond.

Commenting on Jim's influence with the 15 and 16 year olds, Assistant Headteacher Mrs Lowing said:

"Jim genuinely is one of the most motivational coaches I have ever met and his ability to connect with students is indeed very special and impressive. Whether it's the New York accent or his former career as a pro-American footballer, students really listen and take on board the messages Jim says. He makes them realise how important their education is and how their time at school is the key to them achieving their best and the gateway to any future they may like to determine".

Jim, who started working with Harrow Way in 2012, led a session with the Year 11s on 'the big picture', encouraging students to look beyond school and their GCSE exams to their future. Deploying his 'state of mind' technique he gets students to imagine their future – what they'd like to do, how much money they might like to have and the choices they would like to make.

He encourages students to have self-belief and to adopt a positive mindset and use some practical

strategies for getting the best out of themselves, all of which are illustrated by Jim in a highly animated and entertaining way.

He is keen to demonstrate to the students why school matters and how, with an education, they can create their own future.

Our Year 11s are now game ready for the final term.





The Italian Job

Geography students visited the beautiful Italian coastal town of Sorrento over half term, staying in a small fishing village just outside the main town.

A trip to the mighty Mount Vesuvius involved a trek to the crater which is 1281 metres above sea level. It was well worth the effort though with students given a guided tour of the crater, learning about the famous eruption in 79AD which demolished the city of Pompeii. They also heard about the latest eruption in 1944 and the city's evacuation plans in the event of another eruption. We're not sure if it's reassuring or not that it currently takes three days to evacuate the whole city if the volcano were to erupt!

Naturally a visit to the ruins of Pompeii is a must and students spent some time wandering the old streets investigating evidence of the impacts of the eruption. They saw the bodies 'frozen in time' and couldn't help but feel empathy for the people, children and even dogs that were killed in the eruption which covered the town in ash, killing 2,000 people.

Next the beautiful island of Capri beckoned where students walked to



the famous Arco Naturale – an amazing coastal arch carved through hundreds of years of coastal erosion. From the arch students went on to explore the grotto to see where pirates used to smuggle their goods onto and off the island before a successful day was concluded enjoying traditional Italian cuisine in the main square.

On the final day, volcanoes were back on the agenda with a visit to the active Solfatara where our geographers were fortunate to meet and talk to volcanologists who only work at the volcano once

a month. They demonstrated how they measure the temperature inside the volcano and how they used gas sampling to monitor its activity. Apparently the crater has risen hugely over the past few years and the volcano is now on amber alert and evacuation drills are practiced regularly in the event of any activity.

For those of you who have ever toasted marshmallows on a fire – our students can top that. How many of us can say we've toasted marshmallows over volcanic vents? We know 30 Geography students who can!

Year 8 are growing up and growing up fast!

Year 8 seems to be zooming by and we are already fast approaching the final term.

We have had a very successful Dare Not to Swear Valentine's Disco and Valentine's Cake Pop Sale which collectively raised £150. The Year 8 Student Council will now use these funds to buy some charity wristbands to further promote the Dare Not to Swear campaign throughout the school.

We run these initiatives like a business enterprise so money from

wristband sales will go towards buying more charity bands and raising funds for a Student Council project next year.

Tutor group 8EM delivered an amazing assembly on LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender). This also included a Kahoot quiz which answered anonymous questions from the year group so they could find out more about LGBT and ask the questions to which they didn't know the answer to.

Reports are due out and we had the Year 8 Parents' Evening on 27th March. Preparations are also being put in place for the forthcoming Options Meetings. This is an exciting time for Year 8 where they get to select their options for Year 9 with many looking forward to making decisions about their future.

NCS Champion School signs up champion number of recruits for 2017

Since 2014 Harrow Way has been a National Citizen Service (NCS), Champion School. This government-backed youth citizenship programme has been designed to help young people build skills for work and life, take on new challenges and meet new friends. This year we signed up an incredible 53 Year 11 students to the programme, which is the highest number of recruits of any other school in Andover and one of the highest across Hampshire.

Mr Lawrie, Head of Year 11 explains why he's all in favour of NCS: "We fully support any initiative which encourages our students to expand their horizons, learn new skills and enrich their lives. The NCS can only be a very positive experience and feedback from last year's participants was that it was hugely rewarding and for



some, quite life-changing. I am delighted that such large numbers from our Year 11 are taking part and hope to see them reap the immediate benefit and the longer term rewards as well."

The NCS programme itself is made up of four phases that will develop student leadership, teamwork and communication skills. These are put into practice when they are given the opportunity to create a project they really care about and bring to life in the Andover community. After graduation, the students will all become a member of the NCS graduate scheme.

There are longer term benefits to taking part in the scheme. It's worth noting that UCAS recognise NCS as an extra-curricular activity which can demonstrate skills on UCAS application forms.

Another busy term for Year 7

It is unbelievable that Year 7 are already over halfway through their first year at Harrow Way and it's great to see so many students from the year group involved in sports. Special mention must go to Bertie Jones and Hannah Salter for running in the County Cross Country event and also to the girls' netball and football teams for performing so well this year.

running of our cluster schools sports competitions and it makes me very proud as a year head to hear the compliments that are given to our students at these events.

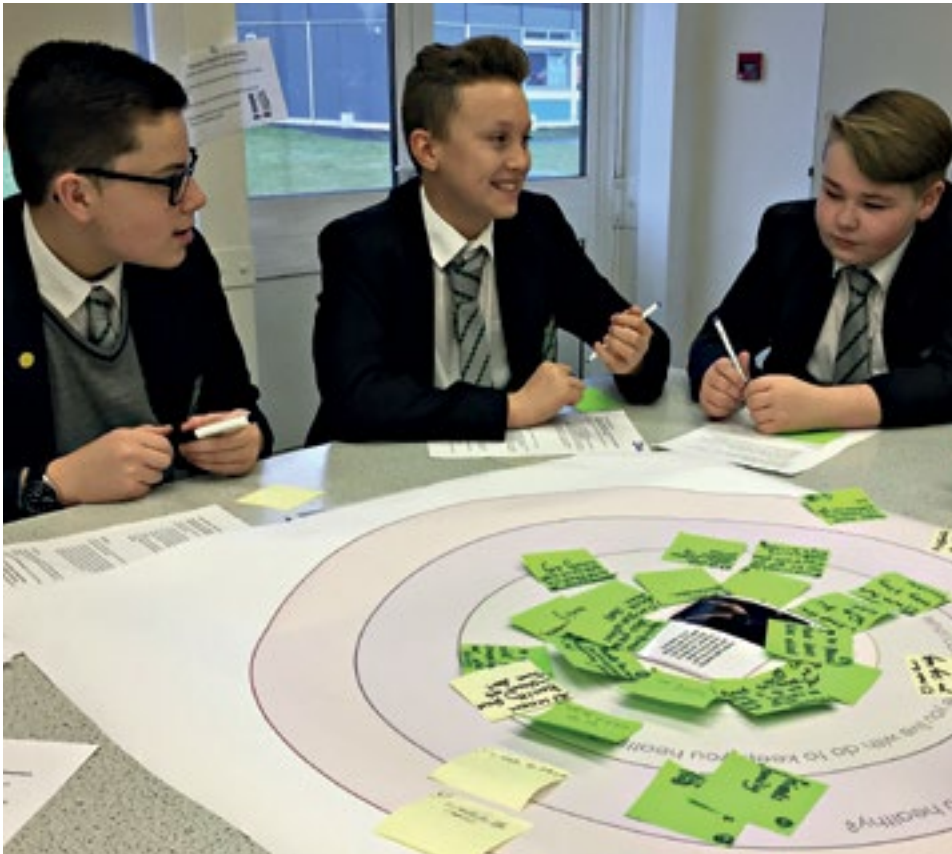

Golding facilitated some creative writing workshops helping the students with their original short stories which need to be 500 words or fewer.

Golding's journey to becoming an author was a roundabout one taking in a number of different careers

from serving as a diplomat with the Foreign Office in Poland to working for Oxfam as a lobbyist.

Learning Resource Centre Manager Ms Burningham, who arranges all author visits to the school said: "Julia Golding has led an interesting life and her journey to becoming a professional author demonstrates to our students that life and career paths are not always clear cut. Her story is fascinating and I hope the students were duly inspired and motivated".

TWO STUDENTS BECOME UNITED NATIONS ENDORSED AMBASSADORS FOR TREE PLANTING ACADEMY

We are lucky in our school that we have a number of students involved with the Tree Planting Academy which is a world-wide organisation supported by the United Nations which aims to train young people to lead their local community to plant for the planet. The project was inspired by Wangari Maathai, a Nobel Peace Prize laureate from

Kenya who planted 30 million trees in 30 years, thereby helping many other women in Africa.

Felix a young boy from Germany then decided that the world should be helping and started 'Plant for the Planet' which aims to plant a million trees in every country.

So far 14,208,845,581 trees have been planted to date as part of this project.

Two students in Year 8 Billy Barnett and Jack Donnelly, were the latest students in our school to become UN endorsed Ambassadors. They underwent a full days training to understand the causes and impacts of global warming, the impact trees can have on combating the greenhouse effect and how to plant and care for the trees. The boys then took part in an impressive presentation to the Deputy Mayor among others where they shared their learning and graduated, receiving their Ambassador Awards.

Each year Harrow Way takes care of a number of trees and nurtures them ready to be planted locally to join the numbers towards the million trees for our country.

Girls' Football
