Parents' Guide post-16

Decisions, Decisions, Decisions

It is now a legal requirement that all young people stay in education or training until their 18th birthday.

The following options meet this requirement:

- Full-time education in a school or 6th form
- Work-based learning such as an apprenticeship, traineeship or employment leading to an accredited qualification
- Part-time education leading to an accredited qualification where the young person is employed, self-employed or volunteering for at least 20 hours a week.

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Full-time education

Full-time education can be at either a college or a school 6th form. A wide range of courses and qualifications are available e.g.

- Academic courses such as A levels
- Vocational courses such as BTECs
- Occupational courses which are preparation for specific jobs such as hairdressing, motor mechanics and catering

Courses are offered at different levels depending on GCSE grades. These are:

- Level 3 courses (e.g. A levels, BTEC level 3) which require at least 5 A*-C grades at GCSE including English Language and Maths
- Level 2 courses require at least 4 grade D grades at GCSE including English Language and Maths
- Level 1 courses require mostly E/F grades at GCSE

Students who do not achieve a grade C in English Language or Maths will be required to retake these subjects alongside their other courses.

Apprenticeships

An Apprenticeship is a job with training which allows young people to earn while gaining nationally recognised qualifications. Training is mostly delivered in the workplace but there is always an element of off-job training, e.g. day release to college. It can also involve block release, attendance at a training centre or time away from work to study.

Apprenticeships are offered in a wide range of occupations. Some are in industries that have traditionally recruited Apprentices such as engineering, construction and hairdressing. Others are in less traditional areas such as animal care, IT and leisure. Although some apprenticeships do not specify particular GCSE grades, increasingly employers are asking for good grades particularly in Maths and English.

Apprenticeships are available at 3 different levels – Intermediate, Advanced and Higher. Most 16 year old school leavers start on an Intermediate Apprenticeship which leads to a level 2 qualification (equivalent to 5 GCSE grade A*-C). Some may start on an Advanced Apprenticeship depending on GCSE grades and the employer's requirement. Advanced Apprenticeships lead to a level 3 qualification (equivalent to A levels). Higher Apprenticeships are equivalent to University level qualifications.

Apprenticeships last on average 2 years. However, it can be anything between 1 year and 4 years.

The minimum hourly rate for Apprentices is currently £3.30. However, many employers pay more.

Apprenticeships are advertised on the website of the National Apprenticeship Service (www.apprenticeships.org.uk). Students can register on the site from early Year 11 onwards. Once registered, they will be sent a text to alert them when suitable vacancies appear on the site. Applications are made online.

Other ways to find apprenticeships are by contacting potential employers direct or by using personal contacts. Potential employers can find out about funding for Apprenticeships on the National Apprenticeship Service website.

Occasionally Apprenticeship vacancies are notified directly to the school. Students are made aware of these via e-mail.

Traineeships

A traineeship is an education and training programme aimed at young people aged 16-24. It includes work preparation, English and Maths support and work experience. It is suitable for those young people who are motivated to work but don't yet have the skills or experience required by employers.
