We are oversubscribed again!

Early indications are that we will be significantly oversubscribed again next September and I would like to acknowledge the trust that the families of Andover are placing in us. Our full Year 7 cohort of 180 students has made an excellent start to their time at Harrow Way. As usual, the outstanding transition programme along with our close partnerships with families has enabled them to settle in to our routines without difficulty.



Harrow Way has a proud attendance record that is now above the national and Local Authority average. This is a reflection that students want to, and indeed, enjoy attending Harrow Way. In essence, if your child is not in school, they will not achieve their full potential. Please ensure your child has good attendance: all students should aim for 100%.

Uniform

I continue to receive many favourable comments about the smart appearance of our students throughout the school. It might be worth reminding readers, particularly at this time of year when students need to wear additional clothing that they are not allowed to wear hoodies or hoodie type garments. We of course have a school jumper – this can be ordered on-line or during the school day from our Uniform Office. For information, the full school uniform list is available on our website as well as on relevant school literature. Please remember that students are required to wear full school uniform on the way to and from school as well as throughout the day.

Building work and news

Important decisions await Year 8

What a fantastic start Year 8 have made to the new school year with all students working hard in class.

It's an important term ahead with students choosing their options around Easter time and they will have to think very carefully about these choices. There will, of course, be lots of guidance provided by the Senior Leadership Team, Heads of Year, teachers and parents to help students make an informed decision.

We had some fabulous discussions on what bullying looks like as part of Anti-Bullying Week. In an extended tutor group students took part in different activities for anti-bullying, all tailored to each year group's needs and ages. As part of this week the Heads of Year put together an assembly on 'random acts of kindness' and like stealthy ninjas, carried out their acts such as breakfast for tutor groups, money attached to the cashless catering system, drinks for students, carrying student's bags for them and soap in the loos. Since the assemblies students have also carried out their own random acts including holding the doors open for each other, complimenting students and staff on their appearance and two lovely Year 8 girls bought a juice and cupcake for Mrs Downes.

Through the Student Council Year 8 are involved in a project with Year 10 and both year groups will be holding a cake sale to raise money for our project. Merry Christmas.

New dance studio 'en pointe'

If you wander around the corner of the Sports Hall during the school day you'll usually hear music blaring and see a frenzy of activity in the new Dance Studio. Complete with interactive board, sprung floor, a wall of mirrors and high quality sound system, it really does have it all and is already making a big difference to students studying dance.

Both Key Stage 3 and 4 students now have their dance lessons in the

purpose built building, with many commenting that it places even more value on the subject than before.

The department has seen a steady increase in students picking dance for their Key Stage 4 options in recent years due to its sell-out live shows and consistently high results. Miss Walker hopes that even more students will opt to pick dance in the future and looks forward to welcoming them into the new studio.





Along with thousands of young people nationally our Year 9 and 10 students recently took part in a world record attempt learning how to help restart the heart of someone who has suffered a cardiac arrest. On the day, with the support of the British Heart Foundation, Resuscitation Council and South Central Ambulance Service, we trained an incredible 297 students in CPR!

Ian James, Community Responder Liaison and Training Officer for South Central Ambulance Service who led the world record attempt training together with staff from Harrow Way said: "We plan to train 100,000 children across the UK on how to do CPR all in one day. A sudden cardiac arrest is still the UK's single biggest killer and the gold standard treatment is prompt CPR and if possible using a defibrillator. The training given to these students should stay with them for life and will be transferable from school to home, to work to social environments. Cardiac arrests can happen at any time, anywhere to any one so the more life savers there are, the better chance a patient has of survival".

Your child may already be CPR trained but if not it is likely they will receive their training during the course of the year as we've set ourselves the ambitious target of training every student and member of staff at the school in basic CPR life support within a year. With training already undertaken and the 297 students trained as part of the world record attempt over 60% of our student population is now CPR trained.

Making our teachers the best they can be

Striving for the highest quality in teaching and learning is the bedrock at Harrow Way so we are always looking for ways to help our staff to develop and grow in their roles. Earlier this year we joined the Teacher Development Trust Network (TDTN), an organisation founded by teachers, dedicated to improving the educational outcomes of children by ensuring they experience the most effective learning.

As in the words of educational expert Dr Dylan William: "If we can create a culture where every teacher believes that they need to improve, not because they are not good enough but because they can do even better, there is no limit to what we can achieve".

Before joining the Trust we had to go through a rigorous audit.

All members of staff (teaching and support) filled in a detailed questionnaire about their continuous professional development. The Senior Leadership Team also went through an audit so that they could self-assess where we currently stand and what we can do to improve. A member of the TDTN then visited the school, talking to a wide range of staff and governors, to make a final judgement on the quality of our professional development.

We were delighted and proud to be awarded the **Bronze Award**.

TEACHER DEVELOPMENT TRUST

This means that the school has been recognised for their great work in the important area of professional development. However, the journey does not stop there and the TDTN will now support us to become even better. We already have plans in the pipeline to visit other schools and develop various training programmes to fully support all of our staff to develop in their roles and, ultimately, to do the very best that they can for our students.

WARHORSE

Those of you with Year 7 students will be well versed in the Michael Morpurgo novel War Horse which we gifted to every student at their induction day with the simple request to read the book by the start of the autumn term as all lessons would be linked to the text. We didn't want these students to feel they were being given work – we just wanted them to read a great book!

We developed this innovative transition and literacy programme for two very simple reasons. Literacy is key to people's life chances with reading books the only out-of-school activity for 16 year olds demonstrably linked to securing managerial or professional jobs (Mori 2013). We also wanted to aid an effective transition from Year 6 and having a War Horse theme across all lessons provides a commonality which is a comforting nod to the primary system. It also ensures that every student has the opportunity to start the term on an equal, level basis.

It's surprising how well War Horse lends itself to each subject, even those you'd least expect it to.

But lend itself it did and to give you a few examples we had students in Science exploring the anatomy of horses. In Maths they converted the price of Joey (the horse) from guineas to pounds and in Dance students looked at army training exercises, marching patterns and actions to represent battle.

We have seen good progress made by our last two cohorts of Year 7 and a great improvement in reading ages. Our current Year 9s, who were the first to experien

were the first to experience our War Horse Project continue to make good or outstanding levels of progress in an environment of increased demand and preparation for final written examinations.

More importantly though is the feedback from students in our 'Student Voice' that

they enjoyed reading War Horse (good pace and challenge) and they liked the fact they arrived at the beginning of term prepared for lessons which all had an increased relevance.

L The great news is that it's been a huge success. Students are making good progress at Key Stage 3 and we believe this initiative, along with other projects and interventions, is raising the literacy standards in our school. **37**

Earlier this year we celebrated some of our best ever GCSE results and recently we held the annual Presentation Evening where we recognised and congratulated the class of 2016 for their contribution to this success. We were especially delighted to welcome back former student and BBC's Great British Sewing Bee's, Josh Barnett as our special guest to present the GCSE certificates and prizes to the award winners.

A very proud Mr Serridge praised the former students for being an outstanding year group who he described as a credit to themselves, their parents and Harrow Way. What, he said, made the class of 2016 so special was the way they matured together, generating a year group ethos, setting standards for themselves and influencing other students in the process.

He went on to comment: "The magic ingredients in a successful school are the staff and their expertise and dedication. All the staff at Harrow Way are dedicated professionals and I thank them. We have a very strong ethos and shared values held by everyone in our school community. Your success would also not be possible without the support of your families and your incredible hard work, resilience and determination. We are extremely proud of you all and I know to achieve the results you did, you pursued excellence and never gave up when faced with challenges".

Mr Serridge went on to introduce Josh Barnett who graduated from Cardiff University in 2014, with a degree in Sports Coaching and shortly afterwards became student union president. Josh was second of the men in The Great British Sewing Bee on BBC Two and is the founder of the clothing range 'Treatment Clothing'. His designs have been worn by the likes of Little Mix and Carley Belmonte from MTV's The Valleys.

Josh told the students that when at Harrow Way as a gifted footballer he was certain it would be the career for him. Unfortunately he was not good enough to play professionally so decided to coach instead. During the summer before his final year at university his mother told him he had to either get a job or do something with purpose during the holidays so he dug out their old sewing machine and got to work experimenting. He continued to sew during his final year and following his graduation campaigned hard to become the university student union president all the while still sewing in his spare time.

Out of 800 applicants Josh was selected to go on the BBC's Great British Sewing Bee and although he didn't win, gained the confidence to try making anything. He said to the students: "Although you may have some idea of the study and career path you may take, make sure you put all your efforts into whatever you do. Never give up and grasp every new opportunity with both hands because you never know what you'll end up doing next".

Students unlock archaeological secrets with top UK experts



When learning about crime and punishment in the Middles Ages, who better to learn from than the experts at Cotswold Archaeology who led the dig at the Saxon burial ground discovered at the Aldi site.

Archaeologist Jez Clutterbuck explained to the Year 10 History students how 124 skeletons were found, sharing some powerful images of skeletons with their hands tied behind their backs, skeletons without limbs and even one or two random heads without their bodies! The students were fascinated to hear about the positioning of the bodies – some who were found as expected for a normal grave site of that time, lined up evenly in rows next to each other, but the majority were found simply discarded on top of each other, haphazardly placed.

Mrs Essop, Curriculum Leader for Humanities said: "It was incredible to hear that so many bodies were found this close to the school. Cotswold Archaeology has managed to date the skeletons to the Anglo-Saxon period as they also found a coin amongst the bodies".

Jez and his team won't start the reconstruction and cataloguing until January following which we hope he will return and tell the students more about this important find in Andover. How fascinating for our students to be learning about a time over 600 years old which can be evidenced right here on their very door step!

Anti-Bullying Week

During the recent Anti-Bullying Week we made time to stop as a whole community and think about the national theme of the campaign 'Power for Good'. Directed by actor Kirsty Cox, who has numerous theatre, film, radio and TV credits to her name, the students gave up their half-term break and every evening to create a mini-masterpiece production of Much Ado About Nothing, considered by many to be one of Shakespeare's best comedies.

Mr Manson, Curriculum Leader for Performing Arts said: "Each year we set our students a huge challenge. They get a script, an experienced professional director and just two weeks to create a perfect performance. Spending time with a seasoned professional, being treated as professionals themselves, is an invaluable, enjoyable experience. They found new ways to bring a 400 year old play to life and make it really funny in the process. Every day of rehearsals they made me laugh out loud, which really took the sting out of losing my half-term break!"

A mere 15 days after receiving the script the Harrow Way cast put on two hugely successful performances, telling the tale of two feisty characters, Beatrice and Benedick. We remember. Ypres – 11th November 2016

Our trip on Remembrance Day started at 5am on a very cold and dark morning. From Andover we made our way to Ypres, in Belgium, home to many cemeteries, memorials and war museums honouring the German-Allied battles that unfolded in the area during World War I.

Unlike your 'normal' school battlefields trip, this was particularly special as it was Remembrance Day itself. Surviving the very early start and long journey, the first stop was Hill 62 Sanctuary Wood Museum where students got to experience an original and preserved trench system. While some of the boys enjoyed running around and getting muddy, the realism of what it would have been like for those soldiers 100 years ago, certainly sunk in.

Next on the itinerary was a tour of the Ypres Salient where students saw another trench system and several war cemeteries. They couldn't help but notice the contrast between the grey and solemn German graves at Langemark Cemetery to the white, pure ones at Essex Farm and Tyne Cot Cemeteries.

The final stop, after a welcomed dinner in the centre of Ypres and a mad dash around a chocolate shop, was witnessing the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate Memorial. While we couldn't get as close to the front as we had hoped, it was a moving and thought-provoking experience nonetheless.

The Flexible Learning Centre – living up to its name

We're very fortunate here at Harrow Way to have an incredible resource which is the Flexible Learning Centre (FLC) and it's fair to say that no two days are the same.

For those of you who have heard of the FLC but aren't sure what its main purpose is, it is to enhance students' access to learning, particularly focussing on those experiencing learning, emotional, social and/or behavioural problems.

The FLC provides a working classroom base for a variety of support work provided by the Inclusion Team and programmes delivered by external agencies. The daily operational activity provides tailor-made supervision based on the needs of specific students which complement and underpin learning within the school.

The FLC is flexible by name and flexible by nature and this is key to the delivery of meaningful

interventions and support across the school. Some of the more regular services provided include:

Great Start Tutor Group

offering identified students a calm environment for the start of the day - a chance for breakfast and the provision of uniform or equipment to allow them to be ready to learn.

Bespoke interventions

for our students on either a one to one or group basis including selfesteem, social skills, organisational skills, anger and behavioural management with each participant working to specific targets.

Support

for those on a reduced/adapted timetable to help them to attend school and make best use of their learning time.



A safe place

for students needing emotional support – for a short period or few minutes to help students remain in school and return to lessons quicker. We also provide supervised break and lunch times for our more vulnerable students.

Homework Club

is offered to all students on Tuesdays between 3pm and 4pm where they can use school computers and resources. Due to the popularity of the Club we now have at least three adults in attendance each week to help students.

Student Voice – The Pod

The School Council and Student Voice play an important and influential role in our community here. The focus is to have a definite impact on specific aspects of school life such as the new 'eat well' Pod, a School Council idea from last year, which has made a big difference to students.

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"Queuing for food in the school auditorium often ate into break time and left us with little time before the

beginning of the next lesson. The 'Pod' has helped by giving students the option of grabbing some tasty snacks without having to queue for too long.

The Student Council are looking into how we can increase the healthy options at school, but for now The Pod gets a firm thumbs up from us".
