PiXL Club-

The last two years we have been members of The PiXL Club (Partners in Excellence). The PiXL Club is a collaboration of school leaders, headed by Sir John Rowling; this is a club that some have said to be "the best thing they have seen in education". Partners in Excellence work with over 1200 secondary schools. The focus is on raising standards at GCSE.

The PiXL Club aims to support the promotion of excellence for students. The club is about sharing new ideas and we have been able to use a variety of strategies which support us further in achieving the very best outcomes for our students.



Annual Parent Survey

Every year we undertake an evaluation of our performance, acknowledging our successes and also identifying the areas that we need to improve. Parental input is essential if the process is going to be truly meaningful and the evidence we collect helps to determine the priorities for the year ahead and longer term. After Easter we will be asking parents to complete our annual questionnaire. As in previous years the information we receive from the questionnaires will be fed back to you via the school newsletter and will be discussed at Staff Meetings and Governors' Committee Meetings to form the basis of the next School Improvement Plan.

We have been delighted at the very good attendance at our subject-based consultation evenings. We have managed to see

or speak to 100% of our parents at recent events. An online booking for Parents' Evening appointments is now available for parents to use and we have had good feedback from our Year 9 parents who trialled the system for us.

The National Citizen Service

The National Citizen Service (NCS), the government backed youth citizenship programme, has selected Harrow Way Community School to be one of their Champion Schools for 2016. As a Champion School, Harrow Way fully embraces the NCS into their ethos. Year 11 students can join the programme which has been designed to help young people build skills for work and life, take on new challenges and meet new friends.

The innovative 'Harrow Way Guarantee' proving to be a success

Only last term we launched an innovative new initiative to Year 7, 'The Harrow Way Guarantee,' and it's already proving to be a huge success! Through a series of activities students are encouraged to be better citizens with a greater understanding of life beyond and within their immediate community.

Deputy Headteacher Mr Warren, who introduced the innovative scheme to the school said: "It's very simple. There are five categories, all of which encourage and challenge the students in different ways."



Category		
1	Perform for a variety of audiences	Take part in a debate or public speaking competition or deliver a presentation to a large audience are some of the suggestions which show increasing maturity and confidence
2	Take advantage of enrichment opportunities	Try something new, whether tapping into the wealth of extra-curricular activities on offer at school, visiting another town/city or exploring a tourist attraction. The key is to "explore new horizons"
3	Make a contribution to society	Develop responsibilities within the community. Volunteer for a worthy cause, organise or lead an activity or group or take responsibility for how the school looks by keeping an area litter free. In essence - put others first and give something back. To support this, the chosen charities this year are Icknield School and Andover MENCAP
4	Be involved in the wider life of the school	Take on a position of responsibility or vote for something that affects the school community. Represent your house or the school in a team or competition or produce a piece of work for display in the school
5	Show all round learning	Look and be inspired to seek knowledge and experiences beyond the classroom by perhaps visiting a museum, art gallery or exhibition. Attend a sports performance, a concert or go to the theatre and write a review of it or go international and communicate with somebody in another country

Each student has their own personal, web-based blog to record evidence (text, photos or videos). Trained Digital Leaders from Year 8 will check the blogs regularly and work with the Year 7s if more information or detail is required. At the end of the two years, in May 2017, each student will be assessed by the Tutor and Head of Year for the quality of their blog, attendance, behaviour and attitude to learning. A special Graduation for parents and students in July 2017 will acknowledge students who complete the Guarantee with Pass, Merit or Honours.



Year 8 have had a busy term. With only 10 ½ weeks, lessons have been jam-packed. There have been many after school activities and sports fixtures, notably the girls' football team comfortably winning their first game at home and two of our rugby players playing up a year to represent Harrow Way in a Year 9 local schools' competition. We have also started a dance club on a Monday after school that is exclusive to our year group as Year 8 don't have the same access to dance in the curriculum. Some of Year 8 will also be involved in the successful production of Grease.

As a pastoral team, we are very pleased to see attendance has improved from the previous year. We are up by 1.56% which is huge in attendance terms and are proud of the efforts that many pupils have gone to, to improve their attendance (and we hope this continues). Behind the scenes, we are gearing up for taking the year group through their first chance at selecting options for Year 9 with many pupils looking forward to making decisions about their future. All in all, we continue to work hard in line with our three school rules: Be Ready, Be Respectful and Be Your Best.

These are players who are solely focused on the game and representing their country and whether playing rugby or studying at school – the message is the same and that's why this was an invaluable trip for the students."

Since 1995, our Shakespeare Project has set the same challenge to Year 11 BTEC Drama students: to take a full Shakespearean production from page to stage in just two weeks.

During the February half-term week, with the support of professional actor, Louise Kempton (Warhorse, Dorian Grey and Doctors), our thespians rose to that challenge. The play, a collection of Shakespearean scenes, explores the theme of love from many angles: romantic love, familial love, abusive love; love that creates and love that destroys.

Curriculum Leader for Drama Mr Manson said: "In just 12 days after they first set foot in the rehearsal room, the Year 11 students were ready. Their final challenge - to entertain more than 400 people over 3 nerve wracking shows. The result - a wonderful, sold-out performance that, we hope, offered its audience yet another good reason to love Shakespeare."

The latest progress data shows that Year 7 are working hard and generally on target to achieve the challenging targets. Year 10 win Coca-Cola South East Regional Real Business Challenge

A team of Year 10 Business Studies students have been crowned regional champions for the South East at this year's Coca-Cola Enterprises (CCE) Real Business Challenge, after impressing a panel of judges with their litter awareness campaign.

This year's national competition saw over 100 secondary schools across 11 UK regions put their business skills and creativity to the test during a series of regional competitions.

The students travelled to Brighton to take part in the challenge, which this year involved developing an awareness campaign encouraging members of the public in Andover not to litter. CCE business volunteers were on hand to mentor the teams, giving students encouragement and professional advice, before they presented their ideas to a panel of judges, which included experts from litter campaign groups Keep Scotland Beautiful, Keep Wales Tidy, Hubbub and Clean Up Britain.

Next stage for the business whizzes is the Real Business Challenge Grand Final in London in March. During the two-day final stage, the students will present their campaign to MPs including Stephen Crabb, Secretary of State for Wales, at the House of Commons for the Real Business Challenge Parliamentary Reception. From there they will go on to compete against ten other regional champions at the challenge's Grand Final for the chance to win a 3D printer for Harrow Way.

A very proud Mr Serridge said: "The team has done incredibly well to reach the final from an original 870 schools nationally who entered the competition. The process has seen them all develop many key business and creative skills as well as learning to work effectively as a team, utilising each individual's strengths to create a great awareness campaign which obviously impressed the judges. We are all very proud of their success"



The House System

There are three houses at Harrow Way (Buzzards, Kestrels and (Sparrow) Hawks). The names were selected following a student vote and were inspired by Birds of Prey being such a common sight in our surrounding countryside. Competitions are held throughout the year from sporting events to performing arts, photography and cooking with students and staff being able to win points for their houses.

The main contributor toward house success are daily stamper totals (achieved by being ready, respectful and your best each lesson) and through attendance; these are the 'backbone' of house point scores although the points awarded for participation in and winning competitions often make the difference when the grand totals are revealed in the final assembly of the year.

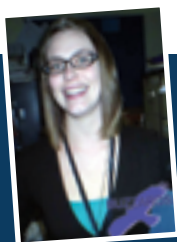


Buzzard House

International travel widens students' horizons

They saw Times Square, often referred to as 'The Crossroads of the World' and enjoyed a visit to Central Park, the first public park created in the US where they explored the various sights. Naturally being a school trip there were some more cultural sights to be experienced! These included the American Museum of Natural History which is one of the largest and most celebrated museums in the world and with our fine reputation for performing arts we couldn't go all the way to New York without experiencing Broadway.

Naples in Italy was the destination of our second trip with students experiencing many of the sights the area is famous for. A visit to Mount Vesuvius, the only active volcano in Europe, included a bus journey to 1000m altitude followed by a significant hike. According to the students on the trip it was more than worth the physical effort to reach the summit! From Vesuvius students went on to visit the ash stricken town of Pompeii, shocked to see the sight of frozen people and the ash stained walls.

A ferry trip to the island of Capri brought mixed blessings with some students having stronger sea legs than others. Once on firm ground though they all enjoyed exploring the island with some taking the chair lift to one of the highest points – apparently as high as the clouds and another group walking 927 steps down from their high view point.



Opportunities and experiences for Year 9

The second term for Year 9 has, as always, been jam-packed with opportunities and experiences for the students to get stuck into. The term started with the Year 9 PE group completing their climbing course at Sparsholt College, allowing the students to try something new, and use it as a mock assessment for their GCSE.

The month of January continued with the Youth Speaks competition, which was hosted by Harrow Way, and saw a team of Year 9s speak about the importance of identity and 'being me'.

The Year 8 and 9 Girls' Football team made it two District champions in two successive weeks following the Year 9

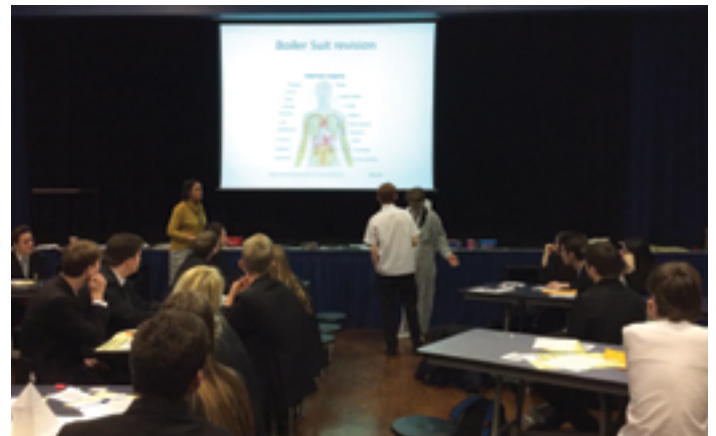
Seven Chakras help prepare Year 11

With GCSE exams just around the corner we have spent valuable time this term helping Year 11s with their revision and exam preparation. Students enjoyed a series of workshops imparting a number of traditional, creative and even 'bonkers' techniques including a session led by a chakra expert Nicola Sage.

Miss Atherton Head of Year 11 comments on the success of the day: "We started with a video of interviews featuring last year's leavers and what they would do differently if they could do it all again. This was very powerful with the messages really hitting home with the students as they recognised or know the individuals in the film."

The seven chakra Contemplation workshop was a journey of self-awareness. Students rated themselves on dealing with various issues such as being comfortable following their own desires or following what other people want and finding it hard



to say no. The session got students to identify the root cause hindering their revision such as 'finding time.' From here they worked backwards to find the real barrier enabling them to move on with their preparation.

A particular highlight of the day was the 'Bonkers Revision' workshop featuring the unusual and the creative but all which help make the key subjects stick. Students tried using smelly pens for certain topics, revision mind maps and road maps. They learned keywords by writing on biscuits and eating them and even wrote on revision boiler suits!
