BBC SHERLOCK, SHERLOCKED

The character of Sherlock Holmes has captivated the nation for over a century, with many incarnations of the role making their mark on TV and film history, but the BBC has found the perfect way to pay tribute to this popular icon with its ground-breaking series 'Sherlock'. Sherlock gets everything right from the get go, the cast are all great--as one would expect when you have Benedict Cumberbatch and Martin Freeman taking the reins as Sherlock and Watson--but what really sets this modern day adaptation of these classic characters from the rest is the writing team: Steven Moffat (co-creator and head writer on 'Doctor Who' also) and Mark Gatiss were born to write a Sherlock Holmes adaptation, with their witty dialogue and fast paced scripts.

What keeps the series alive is Cumberbatch's performance as the high functioning sociopath, his line delivery is spot-on as well as his costars Martin Freeman and Andrew Scott equally giving extraordinary performances. The camerawork and editing are also great aspects of the show, with its movie style shots as well as the superimposed test appearing whenever Sherlock is solving the crime. This, in my opinion, is what keeps Sherlock from falling into the trap of just being an ordinary crime show, as it thinks the audience is as smart as the protagonist and therefore does not insult their intelligence.

You could argue that only having three episodes in each series is like eating dinner with nothing on your plate, as you are left wanting more, but to me this is only a compliment to the production team as they have accomplished the impossible and made Sherlock Holmes relevant again.

Sherlock will return for a Christmas special later in the year followed by its fourth series in 2016.
