

* Your son/daughter has been provided with a Personalised Learning Checklist (PLC) for each of the three exams. Ask your son/daughter to record each aspect red, amber or green according to how much they feel they know and therefore need to revise. They can also use this to record what they have revised and take note of any topics they may wish to ask their teacher about.

Supporting with revision

- Encourage your son/daughter to use the VLE. The course information and all revision materials can be found under Geography - *NEW GCSE Geography*. This will be updated regularly throughout the year so check regularly.
 - Ask your son/daughter if you can help them we will send them home with regular homework including exam questions and key words to learn.
 Check your son/daughters knowledge with flashcards, quizzes, chat about different topics at dinner, ask them to tell you about a geography case study etc.

Revision Guides

There is also an exam practice workbook available from CGP. This is available from most book stores as well as online sites such as amazon. If your child does complete practice questions encourage them to bring these completed into school for their teacher to check and support.

HWCS

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Not knowing the meaning of a word often means pupils don't answer a question and once reminded of the meaning then realise they have lost vital marks. Please test your son/daughter on the following key words to ensure they know what they mean. You can also ask pupils to tell you about these key words and to use them in a sentence to show they understand the meaning.

Abrasion – When sediment is thrown or rubbed against the base of the cliff as the wave breaks, the land is worn away by abrasion.

Hydraulic Action – An erosive process which involves the pressure of water hitting a surface, compressing air into cracks in the rocks, and resulting in the removal of sediment over time.

Solution - Seawater is slightly acidic and can slowly dissolve certain rock types such as limestone by solution.

Attrition - Over time, large sediment removed by the earlier processes is broken down into smaller, more rounder sediment through attrition as particles hit each other. These smaller particles may then form the ammunition for the next wave to hit the cliff.

Impermeable – a surface that doesn't allow water to pass through it.

Permeable – a surface that does allow water to pass through it.

Geology – rock types.

Geomorphic processes – processes that result in the change in the shape of the earth e.g. along a coastline.

Weathering – the breakdown of material in situ (without transporting it).

Concordant coastline - A concordant coastline has the same rock types along its length.

Discordant coastline - A discordant coastline has alternating bands of different types of rock.

Relevant questions to ask your son/daughter

Encourage your son/daughter to use phrases such as 'this means' and 'this is because' to ensure they are developing their points. If your son/daughter makes a point, ask them the question 'why?'

How does a discordant coastline change shape over time?

How is a wave-cut notch and wave-cut platform formed?

How do groynes stop longshore drift?

How is Swanage Bay protected from coastal erosion?

What are the four types of erosion and how do they work?
