Protest

- A public expression of disapproval or objection to something.
 - Making your voice heard when you think things aren't fair.
 - Standing up for a cause; showing unity with others who feel the same as you.

The Human Rights Act – Article 11

- Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly. This is a right closely linked to the right to freedom of expression.
- It provides a means for public expression and is one of the foundations of a democratic society.
- The right applies to protest marches and demonstrations, press conferences, public and private meetings, counter-demonstrations, 'sit-ins', motionless protests etc.
- The right only applies to peaceful gatherings and does not protect intentionally violent protest.

The Occupy Movement

- A **nonviolent** protest movement, which started in the USA in September 2011.
- By 9 October, Occupy protests had taken place or were ongoing in over 951 cities across 82 countries.
- By October 2012 there had been Occupy protests and occupations in dozens of other countries across every continent except Antarctica.
- The movement protests against social and economic inequality around the world.

Occupy protests around the world





- Nonviolent movements are twice as likely to succeed as violent movements.
- Nonviolent movements often significantly increase the chances of a more peaceful and democratic government emerging in the aftermath.
- There's good reason for the success of nonviolent movements. That's because they're "more likely than armed struggle to attract a larger and more diverse base of participants and impose unsustainable costs on a regime."

Things to take away

- Nonviolent demonstration is the most effective method of protest and can bring about real social change.
- You have a human **right** to protest peacefully as long as this does not impede the human rights of others.
