Leadership and Learning Partner Annual visit

Our LLP (Leadership and Learning Partner) visit from the Local Authority, took place on 12th February. The purpose of the annual visit was to moderate and ratify the school's self-evaluation process.

During the visit an extended discussion was held with me regarding the school's internal data and a learning walk was carried out to view the school in session. Meetings were also held with middle leaders, as well as a learning walk of KS3 and KS4 classes.

"The school will remain low priority for the Local Authority. This is because there is good leadership capacity and leaders are focusing on improving teaching and learning in order to further improve outcomes for the key groups of pupils. Teachers are willing to refresh their thinking and look to research finding to support further developments."

Commenting on what will be his focus as an MYP he said: "With 20% of adolescents experiencing mental health problems each year, we really need to start working on this issue. As a young person myself, I believe that young people should be in the best possible condition, both physically and mentally and we can start helping with this in schools and in lessons."

Wow! What a term it has been, a rollercoaster of inspiring, exciting and engaging activities.





"Nothing we can do in the classrooms here at Harrow Way can ever demonstrate so effectively what life would have been like for those men fighting in these dreadful wars and for the families they left behind living in conditions unimaginable to the average 12-13 year old of today.

However, having immersed themselves in the exhibitions and artefacts at the Museum the students definitely have a greater sense of the war, as they were able to see it through the eyes of those who lived it," said Mrs Brown.
