During lockdown our staff worked very hard to continue teaching and developing our 'remote' school. It has been a remarkable year and we have worked really hard as a community to keep each other safe, as well as provide the best educational experience possible for our students.

September 2021 New Intake

We will be welcoming 210 (30 over our published admission number) students to Harrow Way next year and currently have a waiting list of 55 with 413 applications! The Local Authority has agreed to fund a new modular state of the art Science Laboratory which should be in place by the end of September. I am delighted that Harrow Way continues to be the first choice for families in our area. NEW modular state-of-the-art Science Laboratory coming September 2021

Uniform

At Harrow Way we take pride in our high values regarding student uniform in order to maintain good standards of dress and personal appearance, which are sensible and appropriate for students at secondary school. Our school uniform policy is outlined in the student diary. This avoids inequalities of dress and extremes of fashion, which are often quite unsuitable for work at school.

Behaviour Policy

I am very proud of general behaviour in classrooms at Harrow Way. During our last inspection it was reported that: **"You have created a school that is calm and purposeful."** I firmly believe that great schools never stand still. In light of this we have recently reviewed our behaviour policy with staff, students and parents and next year we are committed to having **'disruption free classrooms'**. We know the effect misbehaviour can have on lost learning time (especially during the pandemic) and harm the life chances of young people. We have refined the 'Harrow Way Behaviour Expectations' and will be sharing these with parents and students in September.

Leadership and Learning Partner Annual visit

Our LLP (Leadership and Learning Partner) visit from the Local Authority, took place on 13th May. The purpose of the annual visit was to moderate and ratify the school's self-evaluation process. During the visit an extended discussion was held with me regarding the school's internal data and curriculum. Meetings were also held with middle leaders and senior staff. I am very pleased to advise that the school will remain a low priority for the Local Authority.

I am delighted to say we are fully staffed for September. We have only a 2.3% movement of teaching staff at Harrow Way this year – we are bucking the national trend which stands at 10–12%

Progress

Student Mental Health

During and since lockdown the topic of poor mental health in young people was and continues to be heavily reported on.

We take our responsibility to support young people and their mental health very seriously. In June we held a tutor standstill, alongside assemblies, work in PHSE lessons, regular sign posting of resources via our enews and there is always the amazing support from our pastoral team.

We also worked with Unloc who have partnered with Southern Health NHS Foundation Trust to create a webinar to help young people find out what support is available locally and to hear their thoughts and ideas on how to improve services the Trust offers.

Working with Unloc students explored:

• How the pandemic has impacted how we feel

- What mental health, mental illness and self-care mean
- Self-care tools and techniques for looking after yourself
- The science of self-care and managing anxiety
- Where to go for help locally
- Three wishes to help improve young people's mental health and wellbeing.


We understand the importance of reading and the magic in stories so we are putting into place a reading programme that will involve every student in Years 7–10 and their tutors.
