


**Wonder Woman (12A)**

**What on Earth is COP26?**

**COP26 is an annual meeting for people all across the globe. Politicians, leaders, and Climate Change Activists meet in different venues every year to discuss what they, and we, can do to help slow down climate change. This year it took place in Glasgow, Scotland and Greta Thunberg's marches have caused quite a stir.**

The globally acknowledged 'success criteria' of this event -from edie.net- were: keeping the Paris Agreement instated, making bold, new climate commitments, economic effects (due do covid-19), engaging in carbon markets and helping nature and wildlife during the climate crisis.

In 2016, the Paris Agreement was signed. Its aim was simple but recently some people have been disputing its effectiveness. The idea was to reduce climate change by less than two degrees. But partially due to Trump's denial and many other factors, it currently isn't working. However, the participants in this year's COP believe it still can so largely want to keep it instated.

Some of the new commitments suggested are stopping deforestation, completely cutting down carbon emissions and to stop coal usage. These are all very big pledges which may be the reason many believe them to be empty promises. If they are successful though, imagine the difference it could make!

One problem that is never going to go away is the higher cost of eco-friendly technology and energy sources to those using fossil fuels. Though the gap in price is decreasing, it is yet to reach an equilibrium. Soon, hopefully it will and green energy will be within budget for all.


Carbon markets were a concept I hadn't heard of before researching it. Simply, it sets limits on how much greenhouse gases are released into the air and shares the 'trading of emission units'. That simply means if a company used less than their limit of carbon, for example, they could give what is left to other companies. This could be a very effective way to reduce carbon emissions.

Finally, the last item on the criteria is trying to do less damage and more help towards nature and wildlife that have been affected by climate change. Examples of this are habitats and oxygen providers like the Australian wildfires or the destruction of coral

reefs across the world. If we can't save these creatures, then we will be in an even worse state than we are heading towards currently.

The climate crisis is one which needs to be addressed immediately and thankfully it is. Talk to our Environmental prefects for more information and ponder this: do you think we can stop climate change before it is too late?

Travis Scott's recent concert, Astroworld, has resulted in the tragic death of 8 people, and injured thousands. 
