What's Really up with Russia?

Amongst the conflict in Ukraine, there have been a lot of misconceptions, as well as completely incorrect or

complicated pieces of information. So, the aim of this article is to explain everything as simply and correctly as possible.

On the 24th



of February,
Russia invaded Ukraine. They focused on attacking
the eastern cities such as Kyiv and Dnipro but plans
show that forces will move towards the west from
there. Vladimir Putin annexed (forcefully took) Crimea in 2014. Now he has moved on to mainland
Ukraine.

Why did Putin decide to invade Ukraine? There have been many speculations that may not be true. However, the facts and official reports show that Russia's president is trying to prevent his own country's invasion as much as possible by stopping bordering countries from joining NATO. NATO is an alliance between many "Western" countries, such as the UK and the US. Originally, Europe was separated into communist and capitalist countries. To prevent a war, after WW2 the capitalist countries created NATO.

After the fall of communism, some "Eastern" countries joined NATO and the organisation promised not to take in any more countries after that. Another common misconception is that NATO is similated to the EU. However, only European countries are in the EU.

What does the "Z" symbol mean? You might have seen this on Russian gymnast Ivan Kuliak at a medal presentation. It is used on the back of Russian Military vehicles, and has started to become a pro-war symbol for marches in Russia. Some people claim that it is becoming the modern Swastika because it had another meaning before, but is now used to spread fear and terror in the same way.

What do you think?

Ukraine currently has over 2 million refugees; the number will certainly rise. Though it is a completely devastating time, there are many heroic acts being performed every day. And even though we have sent support to Ukraine in supplies and weapons, it is very unlikely at this point we will get involved properly- unless Putin invades another country that is currently in NATO. The Lowdown on the Winter Olympics

The Winter Olympics 2022 started on 4th February and ended on the 20th. Like the summer Olympics, the event happens every four years in different cities across the world, this year being Beijing. The events held are a mixture of different winter sports such as skiing, ice skating and ice hockey.

Norway led the medal standings with 35 medals, followed by Russia with 29 and Canada who took home 25. Team GB went for a long time without gaining any medals, but they took silver in the men's curling and gold in the women's curling, putting them in joint last place with a few other countries in the medal standings with 2 overall. It's better than not being on it at all; for a while they were at risk of not taking home a medal for the first time in over 30 years.

Elsewhere in the competition, Russian ice-skater Kamila Valieva was in danger of being the youngest Olympian athlete banned from the Games at 15 following her failed drug test. Findings revealed that a test she had taken for trimetazidine, a drug that boosts endurance and is banned in sports competitions, had come back positive. She was permitted to continue to compete during investigations. The Figure Skating Federation of Russia has not yet indicated their choices of three women to send to France for the ISU World Championships – for which Kami-

la remains eligible to compete – unless a negative outcome for doping is filed against her before the championships.

Subject Deep Dive on...Spanish




