Curriculum Organisation

School should give children the wherewithal to participate, to make choices, to understand and to be free to think, to explore, to test their values and to find meaning in their lives.

We offer a broad and balanced curriculum, allowing students to develop a passion for learning across a wide variety of subjects. Our aim is to provide an excellent education for all our students; an education which brings out the best in all of them and prepares them for success in life.

KEY STAGE 3: Years 7 and 8

In Years 7 and 8, all students will follow the National Curriculum, which includes English; Mathematics; Science; Design & Technology; Computing; French or Spanish; Dance; Music; Art and Design; Drama; Geography; History; Physical Education (PE); Religious Education (RE); Personal, Development (PD).

Transition Year: Year 9

At the end of Year 8, students will be guided on to an appropriate pathway for Year 9 study. This will be decided in consultation with parents, giving due diligence to statutory requirements and according to the students' strengths and interests. In addition to the Core Curriculum of English; English Literature; Maths; Science; RE; PE; Citizenship and PSHE, and national curriculum subjects History, Geography, and a Modern Foreign Language, students also have the opportunity to choose five further subjects they have studied at Key Stage three or may choose from new subjects such as Drama; Dance; Sociology; Media; D&T or Health & Social Care.

KEY STAGE 4: Years 10 and 11

At the end of Year 9, students will be guided as to which of these subjects it would be best for them to continue to follow in Years 10 and 11, in order to gain accreditation.

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English

English in the modern secondary school is a broad and diverse subject that explores the many different ways in which we communicate. The English Department at Harrow Way is



committed to the development of the various skills needed to study and create texts across a range of forms and genres.

The Department leads students to academic success, sharing positive relationships with classes whilst maintaining high expectations and levels of behaviour. We encourage students to develop a resilient attitude to their work through regular feedback and opportunities to reflect independently on

progress and targets.



Throughout KS3 and KS4 we maintain a close focus on reading skills such as retrieval and analysis, combined with the development of students' creativity and technical accuracy through writing work. At GCSE, we offer two qualifications,

English Language and English Literature, both of which are delivered through a stimulating and engaging curriculum. Please have a good look around the Department, to get a feel for the type of work that students are currently producing.

Mathematics

As a department, we are passionate about the belief that every student should have the opportunity to learn and enjoy mathematics. We build upon the strong foundations developed in primary school, embedding key skills and extending them further. At Key Stage 4, we focus on deepening understanding of topics such as ratio, algebra and geometry, ensuring that students are confident in applying their knowledge.

Lessons are taught using a variety of methods to suit different learning styles, from practical activities and investigations to written work. Our aim is to equip students with the mathematical skills they need to succeed both in school and in their future lives.

Students are also given the chance to take part in the National Maths Challenge, celebrating problem-solving and achievement.

It is our intention that all students leave Harrow Way Community School having had a positive mathematical experience as well as

having achieved their full potential in the subject.

On Open Evening visitors will be able to look at maths activities and examples of the Year 7 Mathematics programme.

Science

In Science we aim to challenge our students to explore and explain the world around them.



Our Key Stage 3 curriculum has an emphasis on evidence-based learning. Students are encouraged to become independent thinkers and learn to develop the skills which will allow them to take control of their practical investigations.

At KS4 most students will follow a Combined Science course. The combined GCSE provides the students with 2 GCSEs. Some students will have the opportunity to

sit the separate sciences: Biology, Chemistry and Physics. This will result in 3 GCSEs. Students will be guided towards the most appropriate course for them, and each course will challenge students to use the skills they have developed in the

lower school to explore scientific phenomena in greater depth. They will learn to use their scientific knowledge to make informed decisions about the important issues facing them, in their rapidly changing society.



In labs E006 and E008, students will be demonstrating a variety of tasks from our Science curriculum.

Art & Photography

The Art department provides opportunities for students to find their artistic strengths by experiencing a wide range of materials and techniques, including drawing, painting, printmaking, and sculpture. Through contextual, illustrative, experimental and design projects they learn, build upon and extend art skills. All our projects aim to give students the opportunity to take their work in personal directions so that they can express themselves creatively.

At Harrow Way Community School we offer Art and Photography as separate curriculum pathways from Year 9, which students can then take forward to GCSE in Years 10 and 11.

Off-site activities and visiting artists provide an extra layer to the subject, and after school clubs are offered to support projects, homework and to extend skills.

Computing and ICT

The Computing and ICT Department is proud to offer a curriculum that is extremely well-equipped for the modern

technological age. All KS4 students are offered the opportunity to take a qualification in Computing and ICT to prepare them for real life experiences.



At KS3 (Years 7 and 8)

students discover the world of Computer Science and ICT. Teaching and learning is driven through G Suite: specifically the use of Google Classroom, and the available apps providing students with the opportunity to use the latest cloud technology and become equipped to work effectively in the 21st Century.

We cover most common digital applications including word processing, spreadsheets and presentation software. In Computer Science we teach Networking, Computer Architecture, Data Representation, computational thinking and encourage students to become thoughtful, resilient programmers using Python from Year 7.

We also run an after school Year 7 & 8 Computer Science club called the "Gold Programme" and offer additional programming support for our KS4 pupils. We also run trips to Bletchley Park and The Royal Signals.

Design & Technology

Level 1/2 Hospitality and Catering, GCSE Design and Technology



Design and Technology lessons are a dynamic, creative and exciting place for learning while promoting innovation and excellence. We set high standards and

expectations for our students so they feel proud of what they have learned and created. Success further up the school really begins with a good foundation of knowledge, skills and a positive challenging and engaging approach. Assessment happens in all lessons through verbal and written feedback, with an emphasis on celebrating positive achievement, engagement and effort.

All projects through KS3 and KS4 are designed to build confidence and skills across a wide range of techniques including: CAD/CAM design and development, 3D printing, laser



cutting, soldering small components and culinary skills. Each project involves practical work and considers a user, purpose and function of the final product. All students are encouraged to think, explore, inquire, challenge and question while problem solving and making decisions, and all groups are of mixed ability.

In **Design and Technology** all students research and explore different areas of study to identify user needs. They identify and solve different design problems and reshape their design brief to develop a design specification. This informs the design of innovative, functional, appealing products that respond to needs in a variety of situations. Students explore a variety of design approaches including biomimicry, user-centred design and systems to generate creative ideas iteratively, and present their findings using annotated sketches, detailed plans and 3D modelling. In **Hospitality and Catering (KS4)**, the main areas covered include the environment in which hospitality and catering providers operate and the provisions available, health safety and hygiene, food choice and food nutrition and health. All students cook a repertoire of sweet and savoury dishes for healthy and varied diets.

Off-site visits include: Cadbury's World, as well as visits to local design and engineering firms such as Stannah and Input Joinery. We also are participants in the Green power battery powered Go Kart racing challenge, events take place at local racing tracks such as Goodwood.

During your Open Evening visit:

AOO4: Variety of skills being presented with testers available if you are hungry

E001: Students creating 3D work using the 3D printer or other modelling and making techniques, small workshops creating projects with a variety of skills and students working on their GCSE coursework.

Geography

In the Geography Department we aim to inspire and enthuse our students to take an interest in the world in which we live, and to develop an active, caring and informed attitude to the past, present and future.

This dynamic subject is constantly changing, like our world, and we take advantage of current geographic events and how they shape our

world. From wild weather and megacities to volcanoes and earthquakes, we cover it all!

We motivate and challenge our students to reach their potential, and then surpass it.

Field trips offer opportunities for

students to employ different learning styles and put their knowledge into context. Previous field trips have included The New Forest, Kew Gardens, Swanage and Lulworth Cove – as well as residential trips to Osmington Bay and the Bay of Naples, for those that continued their studies at GCSE and beyond. We are also very excited to announce our first trip to Iceland this May!

Health & Social Care

Health and Social Care is offered as a BTEC Level 1/2 Tech award. Students will be assessed through 3 separate components: Component 1: Human Lifespan and Development, Component 2: Health and Social Care Services and Values, and Component 3: Health and Wellbeing. Components 1 and 2 are internally assessed across years 10 and 11 and Component 3 is an external synoptic assessment which will take place during year 11.

We try to make the course as practical as possible, to enable students to gain a real understanding of working in a care or health environment.



During the course students will study a range of topic areas aimed to give them

the skills they need to prepare them for further

education in care. Over the course of

2 years we study care values, study the six different stages of life from infancy to later adulthood, gain a broad understanding of the types of health and social care services available to service users, and the barriers which prevent access to service. The course will give students a good understanding of the career opportunities and job roles available to them in the care industry.

During Open Evening, our students will be on hand to show their work.

History

Our vision in the History Department is to encourage our students to develop a genuine love of History. Using an enquiry-based approach we encourage our students to become young Historians. Within the classroom environment they have the opportunity to form questions about the past, questioning evidence and forming their own opinions, which in turn allows them to develop their own analytical and reasoning skills.

History is all around us – on the TV, in newspapers, on bookshelves and at the cinema. At Harrow Way, we believe that History forces students to ask questions about particular people, events or cultures – not just Where and When but more importantly, Why and How. Trips are an exciting way to

bring History to life and we aim to offer a variety of trips across the year groups. Examples include a Battlefields trip and Hampton Court Palace in KS3. We strongly believe in the power of stories, and use these to encourage a love of



history and a desire to know more about how Britain became the country it is today.



Media

Media covers a range of topics and skills. It explores many different media forms, institutions and genres including films; magazines; newspapers; television; advertising; video games; websites and the music industry.

Students who study Media learn skills such as how to analyse a moving image text, how to create a professional production and how to explore the issues represented in the media.

At Harrow Way Community School we offer Media as a curriculum pathway from Year 9, which students can then take forward to Years 10 and 11.





Media is always popular with students and offers skills that cross over to many other subjects – as well as increasing the diversity of the students' qualifications.

With the new specification, these subjects offer a mixture of both theory and practical assessments, which will widen students' choice of subjects when they start to consider further education.

Modern Languages

Learning a language is fun! It helps people understand how their own language works. Britain is a global market and employers consider the ability to communicate in and understand another language a real asset. We hope to foster a love of language, an eagerness to communicate and an openness to other cultures.

We are fully staffed with specialist teachers who are keen to pass on their expertise and enthusiasm. Every classroom is equipped with a Smartboard.

In Key Stage 3 we use the Studio and Viva courses for French and Spanish, supplemented with internet resources and Active Teach.

Lessons may involve many varied activities in listening, speaking, reading and writing, and we try to organise a trip to Paris each year.

Sienvenue

At Key Stage 4 students may choose to continue studying Spanish and/or French for GCSE.



During Open Evening visitors may be able to learn simple words with our current students.


Performing Arts

Students in Year 7 have a single period of Drama, Dance and Music every week; in Year 8 students continue to have a single period of Drama and Music every week. During lessons,

students engage in a range of practical work intended to give them the skills required to take part in the performing arts throughout the rest of their lives or for further successful study in Key Stage 4 (Yrs 10-11).



The Performing Arts department at Harrow Way offers a wide range of exciting opportunities: workshops with industry



professionals, links with colleges, regular performances, competitions, a range of after-school clubs and theatre trips.

At Key Stage 4 we offer the BTEC Award in Dance and GCSEs in Drama and Music. The BTEC Award and GCSEs are equally valuable qualifications.

We are proud to say that our Performing Arts students often achieve some of the best results in Hampshire.

We run a wide range of extra-curricular activities: Drama Club, Technicians' Club, Show Choir, Pop Band and Dance Club, not to mention the big school musical and Dance show. These clubs engage in a number of performances throughout the year and compete in events such as the Andover Dance Festival and the national Dance Live competition.

As you move around the Performing Arts areas you will be able to take part in various activities and see examples of our recent performance work.

Personal Development

We aim to have a balanced and broadly based curriculum which promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, and social development of students at the school. Personal Development prepares students at the school for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of adult life.

Personal and Development is a statutory entitlement for all students.

In Years 7 and 8 students have at least one lesson a week of Personal Development. This ensures we cover a variety of topics to help develop students' emotional intelligence and life skills. At Harrow Way we believe these skills are as important as academic skills.

In Years 9, 10 and 11 students have 10 weeks of each of the following subjects: PSHE, Citizenship, and Careers.

During Open Evening our students will demonstrate CPR and First Aid. Also there will be a chance to take part in election processes.



Physical Education

PE at Harrow Way is highly valued. We recognise the importance of physical fitness and mental wellbeing and we aim to ensure that students develop a life-long love of physical activity and sport.



Lessons are challenging, engaging and fun. They encourage teamwork and develop individual skill and lessons are fully inclusive ensuring we cater for all abilities through our creative curriculum map. Students are exposed to a wide variety of sports and activities such as

athletics, badminton, football, netball, rounders and rugby; with lessons focussing on the development of stamina, skill, strategy and sportsmanship. In Year 9 you will have the opportunity to follow an academic pathway leading on to GCSE PE or NCFE Health and Fitness in Year 10 and 11.

In Year 11 students have an option based curriculum creating ownership over their participation in physical activity.

The Department also offers extensive extra-curricular opportunities, with many successes across a range of sports such as netball, athletics, football, cricket, rounders and rugby. We strive to offer enriching experiences outside of the classroom and are constantly developing the extracurricular provision tailored to the students as well as running day and residential off-site trips.

On Open Evening, come and try some rock climbing on our impressive indoor climbing wall, play badminton and basketball or try your hand at new age kurling.


Religious Education


Philosophy and Religious Education at Harrow Way is provided for all students from Year 7 through to Year 11.

During Year 7 and 8, students will study RE once a week for 60 minutes. Students who choose RE in Year 9 as an option will have three 60-minute lessons per fortnight. Year 9 students study Core RE for one lesson a fortnight, but also have the opportunity to opt

for a GCSE in Religious Education, Philosophy and Ethics. This GCSE is becoming increasingly popular.

Philosophy/RE provokes challenging questions about the ultimate meaning and purpose of life, beliefs about God, the self, issues of right and wrong and what it means to be human. There is also a large portion of the course devoted to





Philosophy where students study; animal rights, death penalty and ethics surrounding the sanctity of life. Whilst there is a focus on Christianity, students will also study Judaism and Islam. Philosophy/RE also contributes to promotion of mutual respect in an increasingly diverse society. The department endeavours to make this subject engaging and motivating with lots of discussion about the unanswerable questions.

Sociology

Sociology suits students who are curious, empathetic and who care about social justice. It is an excellent subject for those who are curious about the society they live in, and why people act the way they do. It boosts skills such as critical thinking and data analysis.

Students are able to opt to do a foundation year in the fundamentals of Sociology in Year 9 when they are introduced to the main Sociological perspectives such as functionalism and marxism. They also secure an understanding of some key concepts such as socialisation, values and norms.

Those who choose to take the subject at GCSE build on these foundations to study the Sociology of topics such as Education and Crime & Deviance through the work of some key Sociologists. Students also explore the research methods used by Sociologists to support their theories and get opportunities to do some research themselves.

Learning Resource

Centre

The Learning Resource Centre (LRC) provides a welcoming, inclusive environment actively supporting teaching and learning within the school



It achieves this through the provision of many thousands of books, magazines, vetted website references and specific resource packs. There are 12 computers with internet and printing facilities providing a valuable tool for research, information literacy and homework. We offer a physical library of thousands of fiction and non-fiction books as well as an e-book platform with books, comics, magazines and audio books. All students are automatically enrolled in these. Services are free of charge.



Displays and activities change regularly, reflecting the life of the school as well as national and global events. For example, Holocaust Memorial Day, Safer Internet Day, Human Rights Day, Anti-Bullying Week, Careers Week and many, many more. These are designed to promote

cultural capital and awareness. A calendar is published on the school website.

We run the Hampshire Book Award for Year 8's with Hampshire County Council.

The centre hosts and actively supports a variety of clubs and enrichment sessions during the school week as well as fostering a love of reading through its Library Service and NatterReads Book Group. We have a 30 seat classroom and host various lessons. We also design, implement and evaluate reading interventions and Reading For Success programmes for struggling and/or reluctant readers.

The LRC is open daily to students at break, lunch and after school. We will be available for visits on Open Evening and look forward to seeing you.





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
